

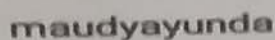

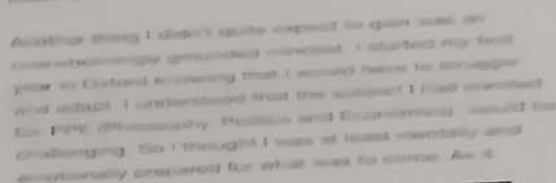

But first the meeting itself: I immediately noticed
misbehavior and some nervous habits. I remember that a
woman I sat about next to me, I sat down to make out
my notes, but it was so much more than that. I also
developed a strange sense of self ownership. It was
more than having to do things on your own, but coming
to those decisions and having the consequences of
your own actions directly attributable to you. It was
about acknowledging the power of your own
performance and decisions. They might sound obvious
for some people, but it was a revolutionary feeling for
me. In my life before going abroad was extremely
challenged. I was a standardised man where I used
improvement with a close and extremely and strong
family support. The internationalism of my family
and community made it a safe haven, but it sometimes
